UPDATE ON SYSTON COMMUNITY CENTRE ROOM CHARGES

Some of you will be aware that our u3a received notification of significant increases in room hire charges. Clarification was sought and it transpired that the letter we received was incorrect. Rather than an increase of over 40%, hire charges will go up by a little over 6%, depending on which room is involved.

By my calculations this will mean the £6.25 rate for the Jubilee Room, which is used by many of our groups, will increase by about 40p an hour. This is a discounted rate as our u3a is a registered charity.

FAMILY HISTORY GROUP

We had a presentation entitled "Lies, Damned Lies and Family History". It highlighted the fact that we cannot rely on transcripts and documents being absolutely correct, and in some cases although they are correct, they don't reflect the true situation. Father's names on marriage registers/certificates are a classic example. An illegitimate person might have made up a name to hide their embarrassment, or if their mother later married, they might name her husband. Whilst a made up name is a lie, the requirements for "father" do not specify that it should be a biological father. Speaking of fathers, you can't assume that a father named on a birth registration was the biological father. If he wasn't, that doesn't mean the birth certificate is/was incorrect, in fact it may well be legally right. A woman's husband is legally deemed to

be the father, unless he proves he is not. Historically he could only do that if he could show he wasn't with his wife at the time the child was conceived (e.g., he was aboard), or he provided medical evidence that he was incapable of fathering the child. Many husband's would have been reluctant to do either. That's before you consider men who were blissfully unaware that someone else had impregnated their wife!

The advent of DNA testing has revealed that, in some cases, a perfectly documented family line is in fact biologically untrue. Whilst records can mislead or lie, DNA cannot.

8th November 2023: Bharat Patel BBC Reporter – His Own Story

Bharat Patel has worked for BBC Radio Leicester, Radio 4, ITV and the BBC. He has covered major events which have made headlines around the world, including the Kegworth air crash, the death of Princess Diana, the Gujarat earthquake and the disappearance of Madeleine McCann. But it's not all been about tragedy. He's also interviewed a parrot who spoke five

languages, the world's oldest donkey and met Brian the Budgie, who escaped from Ilkeston to Corfu but was found by his astonished owners while they were eating a souvlaki under a tree on holiday in Corfu Town.

But there's one story he has never covered and that is his own. By the age of eight he had travelled across three continents. He ended up in Leicester, after a soothsayer told his parents his future lay in England. His family exchanged a comfortable lifestyle in a warm climate in Zambia in Africa for a tiny terraced house with a leaking roof in a much cooler and wetter Highfields. Their arrival in Leicester was followed by a series of bizarre and comic incidents, which were often odder than anything Bharat encountered as a reporter.

Bharat has asked us to make members aware that he will have his book available to purchase for the sum of £10 CASH (no cards).

He's presented his talk to a few local u3a's recently and although people wanted to buy his book, they only had credit cards available, so he couldn't sell any, so he's asking members to bring cash, please – ideal Christmas present! All proceeds go to cancer research.

GUY FAWKES AND THE GUNPOWDER PLOT

As we approach Guy Fawkes or Bonfire Night, I think most of us know the basic story of how Guy Fawkes was caught red-handed in the Houses of Parliament with barrels of gunpowder, about the set them alight and blow up King James, along with a goodly part of the aristocracy. He was not the only conspirator, a total of 13 men were identified as at the heart of the failed plot. But who was Guy Fawkes? Is much known about him?



Guy was born in York some time before 16th April 1570, the date he was baptised at St. Michael le Belfrey church. The actual baptism register is displayed at the church at various times. This is a photo of the register, his entry is the 3rd from the top on the left hand column. Unless you are familiar with the script of the time it is indecipherable. It was common for babies to be baptised quite soon after birth, so it seems likely he was born earlier in that year. What is perhaps a

little surprising is that he did not come from a Catholic family, in fact his father Edward was a lawyer in York's church courts, so he was in fact a Protestant. Edward Fawkes and his wife Edith also had 2 daughters who lived to adulthood and another who died in infancy. Guy's paternal grandfather was also an ecclesiastical lawyer and his grandmother was the daughter of a York merchant, so he came from a prosperous family.

However, his father died in 1579. His mother Edith married again, to the Catholic Dionis Bainbrigge. Guy's religious convictions were clearly shaped by the influence of his stepfather. This was against the background of religious turmoil in which the country had swayed back and forth following Henry VIII's break with Rome, courtesy of the fact that his children did not all share the same faith. Under Elizabeth I the country became firmly Protestant, with those of the Catholic persuasion suffered increasing repression.

He was educated at St Peter's school in York. From there he found employ with the 1st Viscount Montagu (pictured right), who was a staunch Catholic. Despite this, Montagu was a trusted diplomat, who served Elizabeth 1 on missions to both Rome and Spain. Guy Fawkes remained in the service of the 2nd Viscount when he succeeded his father.





At 21 he left to join the Spanish army which was fighting the Protestant forces of the Dutch Republic in the Netherlands. The Army of Flanders as the Catholics were called, was multi-European in make up. He was described by English Jesuit Oswald Tesimond as "a man liked by everyone and loyal to his friends .. something decidedly rare among soldiery, although it was immediately evident to all – a very devout man, of exemplary life." His appearance was described as tall and well built, with reddish brown hair and beard. (see picture left from the St Peter's Foundation - the school he attended)

During his absence abroad, many English Catholics became increasingly discontent with their lot. Robert

Catesby was one such individual. His own father Sir William Catesby had been imprisoned for his faith. Catesby had several connections amongst prominent Catholic families in the Midlands and recruited a core of those who were similarly affronted by their treatment. When James VI of Scotland succeeded Elizabeth I in 1603, becoming James I of England, hopes were high that, despite also being a protestant, his having a Catholic mother (Mary Queen of Scots) would result in improvements to their condition. These did not materialize, added to which Spain and England signed a peace treaty, leaving the English Catholics without the support they had been receiving from that quarter.

Guy Fawkes attended a meeting at the Duck and Drake Inn, which was near the Strand in London on 20th May 1604. By this time, he had become involved with undercover work in Europe amongst the various Catholic communities. He met with Thomas Winter, a close confident of Catesby, in Ostend. It was Winter who later provided a confession that allowed the authorities to establish much of the build up to Gunpowder plot. He was arrested after the attempt had been thwarted. Catesby was killed before he could be interrogated and full details obtained from him. Some historians claim that the excellent spy network developed during Tudor times meant that the conspiracy was known about well beforehand, but that it was decided to allow it to progress in order to capture the maximum number of those involved. Considering how late in the day the plot was halted, I feel these claims stretch the bounds of credibility.

Large quantities of gunpowder could readily be procured in what was a relatively peaceful period in Europe, so the group probably had no difficulty acquiring 36 barrels. They secured rented premises in Southwark to hide them, before ferrying them across the Thames to the Houses of Parliament. Guy Fawkes was likely recruited due to his military background, coupled with the fact that he was well known and trusted in Catholic circles. Explosives experts have assessed how successful the plotters would have been in their aims. They seem to agree that had those 36 barrels been ignited, much of the royal family and a significant proportion of England's nobility would have been killed. Historians do not agree on exactly how the plot came to be foiled. One of the strongest claims put forward concerns a letter warning a peer with Catholic sympathies not to attend the opening of parliament. The "Mounteagle letter" was intercepted and the plot uncovered at the eleventh hour. The

government intelligence service of the day was likely aware that a plot of some sort was being hatched, but may not have established the specifics until very late in the day.

Guy Fawkes was interrogated and likely tortured, but he is said to have held out until for more than 48 hours before confessing. Those involved with the plot and still in the London area were rounded up quite quickly. Catesby and several of his co-conspirators fled to his native Midlands and tried to get a Catholic rising, originally planned as a follow up to the Westminster explosion, off the ground. This failed miserably, they were captured or killed by local militia at Holbeach House in Staffordshire on 8th November. The surviving plotters, especially those with no aristocratic lineage, probably wished they had been killed in the more immediate aftermath. The punishment for treason was execution, but commoners had the added horror of being hung, drawn and quartered. The public executions took place in two batches on the 30th and 31st January 1606. It is claimed that as a commoner Guy Fawkes was more fortunate than some in that his neck was broken at the hanging stage, as a consequence he avoided being disembowelled whilst still alive.


Parliament passed an "Act for the Public Thanksgiving to Almighty God every Year on the Fifth Day of November". That act was not repealed until 1858, by which time the "Thanksgiving" was already firmly entrenched in the national calendar. Church services were held, often with a sermon of an anti-Catholic theme. Celebrations incorporating bonfires and fireworks also became popular. The 1670's saw an increase in anti-Catholic opinion, effigies of the pope and gunpowder plotters were burned on the bonfires. By the early 19th century, Guy Fawkes was the effigy being burned. Later still the cries of children of "a penny for the Guy", whilst dragging a home made representation of Guy around the streets, became a tradition, often accompanied by the rhyme of "Remember, remember the fifth of November, gunpowder treason and plot" (see the full words in Poetry Corner)
